WSAVA List of Essential Medicines for Cats and Dogs

The New Zealand Veterinary Association (NZVA) and Companion Animal Veterinarians Branch (CAV)

Anaesthetic, analgesic, sedative and emergency drugs

- Add to core: all those listed in complementary, especially inhalation agents and non-dissociative anaesthetic agent (propofol or alfaxalone)
- Add to core: injectable Vit K1
- Add to core: calcium gluconate 10% or calcium chloride 10% (calcium gluconate 10% no longer available in all locations)
- Add to core: vasopressor option such as noradrenaline for use in hypotension or septic shock
- Add to core: include fresh frozen plasma, frozen plasma or refrigerated plasma as options in 22) Colloid solutions

Antimicrobial drugs

Antifungal drugs

Add to core: the oral azole antifungals

Antiparasitic drugs

Add to core: 12) Benzimidazoles and probenzimidazoles (febantel, fenbendazole, flubendazole, mebendazole, oxibendazole) - oral fenbendazole is important for treating giardia (Panacur), especially in shelter situations.

Immunomodulatory drugs

Add to core or complementary: oclacitinib
